FY18 OMNIBUS BILL HAS POSITIVE IMPACT ON MO TRANSIT PROVIDERS



MO TRANSIT INVESTMENT

IN MARCH, THE ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE \$1.3 TRILLION FY18 Omnibus Appropriations bill outlined funding for the remainder of fiscal year through Sept. 30, 2018. The FTA was funded at \$13.5 billion, \$1B above 2017 enacted levels. In addition, funding for Bus and Bus Facilities was increased by \$400 million in FY 2018. Transit formula grants came in at the recommended FAST levels with \$834 million in additional transit infrastructure spending including \$400M for Section 5339 bus and bus facility funding.

So what is the impact for MO transit providers?

5339 Bus and Bus Facilities Program FY18 allocations

- Small Urban – \$924,142 (36% increase over FY17)
- Statewide allocation – \$3,500,000 (100% increase over FY17)

The increase in federal funding provides critical funding to replace transit fleets in rural Missouri. A

significant share of the rural transit fleet in Missouri is operating beyond the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) recommended minimum useful life standards. Replacement of these vehicles will support the economic opportunities by providing access to employment centers, educational and training opportunities, and other basic needs.

FY17 allocations:

- Small Urban – \$677,391 (allocated to small urban via formula)
- Statewide allocation – \$1,750,000 (allocations to large urban, small urban, and rural providers)


MEET JIM



Today, after 47 years, we are releasing an updated brand identity, which includes our new logo and an added pop of color. The new logo blends OATS original block lettering with a new tagline. You will start to see our new image anywhere we're out in public, like our website, Facebook, Twitter, The Wheel newspaper, and very soon as we start rolling out fleet with the new logo.

Last fall, focus group meetings were held around the state that were comprised of staff, drivers, volunteers, community agencies and riders that we serve. These groups looked at a variety of options and a few design elements stood out. 1) Include the word "transit" so people know what we do; 2) include the tagline "operating above the standard"; and 3) add some new color.

"We believe the new look helps modernize our image, and tells people not only what we do, but how we do it" {OATS Transit- Operating Above the Standard} said Dorothy Yeager, Executive Director. "We will phase in the new logo when we obtain new vehicles. We won't be replacing decals on existing fleet, but instead phase it in over time so we are more cost-conscious," added Yeager.

A pop of new color (blue), incorporating the word Transit and including a new tagline brings a refreshed look to the company. These changes, along with new mission, vision and values statements, are all part of the company's approach to prepare for its 50th anniversary in a few short years.

3. Spend the night in a yurt. While many people have camped in tents or cabins, few people can claim to have slept in a yurt. These yurts at Lake of the [OZARKS STATE PARK](#) are perfect for a novice camper or an avid camper looking for a new experience.
4. Take a gondola ride. A [GONDOLA RIDE](#) through Kansas City is perfect for a romantic night out. However, this special boat ride is only available during warmer weather.
5. Try some freshly pressed apple cider. [DUNN'S CIDER](#) has been a tradition for many Kansas City area families for decades. They are now open for 41st season so you can get your fix on their freshly pressed cider.

SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

BEAT THE HEAT - Anybody can be at risk for a heat-related illness. Follow these summer safety tips, like taking extra breaks and drinking lots of water.



BUG SAFETY - Mosquitoes can cause a number of illnesses, including Zika Virus and West Nile Virus. Learn what you can do to protect yourself at work and play.

PLAYGROUNDS - Emergency departments see more than 20,000 children ages 14 and younger for playground-related traumatic brain injury each year.



FIREWORKS - Summer is synonymous with barbecues, parades, fireworks displays – and plenty of visits to emergency rooms, especially during July.

WATER SAFETY - Not including boating incidents, on average about nine people die from drowning every day. The younger the child, the greater the risk.



BICYCLING - Bicyclists must take extra precautions when they ride. They often share the road with vehicles, but injuries can happen even on a bike path.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY - Cell phone distracted walking is a huge problem, and rarely are we more vulnerable than when walking, crossing streets and negotiating traffic.



15. OPERATION LIFESAVER - HIGHWAY-RAIL CROSSING SAFETY — 1 hour.

17. REASONABLE SUSPICION TRAINING FOR SUPERVISORS — 2 hours.
18. SAFE & SECURE PROPER INFANT AND CHILD SEAT INSTALLATION — 2 hours.
19. SENSITIVITY AWARENESS — 1 hour.
20. SLIPS, TRIPS AND FALLS — 1 hour. **NEW**
21. WHEELCHAIR SECUREMENT — 2 to 3 hours depending on number of participants.
22. WINTER DRIVING SAFETY — 1 hour.
